



the Family Room of the Church Centre at St. John's Church Hildenborough. There is plenty of free parking and disabled facilities on site.





#### Hildenborough Gardeners' Society



## The Night Sky in Hildenborough – September 2024

The ringed planet, Saturn, is becoming more obvious in our evening skies with it reaching "opposition" on the 8<sup>th</sup>. This refers to the time that Saturn, or indeed any planet that orbits beyond the Earth, is opposite the Sun. In simple terms it means that on that date the Earth. Sun and Saturn will lie in a line with the Earth in the middle i.e. the Earth and Saturn lie on the same side of the Sun. This means that Saturn will then be at its closest to Earth and therefore it will appear at its largest and brightest making it an ideal time to observe it. The other advantage of opposition is that because the planet is opposite the Sun in the sky, as the Sun sets, Saturn rises and is visible throughout the night until sunrise the next day when Saturn will be setting.

At the beginning of the month Saturn is rising close to the east as the Sun sets (around 8pm) close to the west. The ringed planet will be 20° high in the south east by 10:30pm and then almost 30° high in the SSE by midnight. At this time, the other gas giant, Jupiter, and the red planet, Mars, are just appearing over the north eastern horizon although it will be an hour or two before they are clear of the atmospheric turbulence that occurs close to the horizon. The map shows the position of all three of these planets mid-month at 1am.

By the last day of the month Saturn rises in daylight and culminates (lies due south) at 11:30pm which is when it will be at maximum altitude. If you prefer your observing to be of the early evening variety then Venus is visible now immediately after sunset but it is very low down. On the 1<sup>st</sup> it is 7° high between west and WNW, on the 30<sup>th</sup> it is the same altitude but closer to the south west. Please take care not to look for Venus with any type of optical aid before the Sun has set, otherwise you risk permanent eye damage if sunlight accidentally enters your eye.

Astronomical phenomena sadly often occur at unsociable hours, and such is the case on  $18^{\text{th}}$  September when there is a partial lunar eclipse. It begins at 3:12am and concludes at 4:15am with the maximum amount of the Moon being eclipsed at 3:45am. However, be aware that only a very small part ( $3\frac{1}{2}\%$ ) is eclipsed so it will look as if a small chunk is missing from the Moon's north western edge (on a clock face around the 2 o'clock position).

It seems only yesterday that I mentioned the summer solstice but now we are already approaching another autumnal equinox. To say that day and night are approximately equal on 22<sup>nd</sup> September is true but something of an over simplification because the equinox occurs at a specific moment in time and on this occasion, it is 1:44pm. At that moment the plane of the Earth's equator, projected out into space would cut the Sun's disk precisely in half.

#### FARMERS MARKET RECIPE

**Blackberry and Apple Crumble** 

For the filling 900g/2lb Bramley Apples 350-400g/12oz-1lb blackberries 175g/6oz demerara sugar 2 lemons For the topping 225g/8oz plain flour 175g/6oz butter 55g/2oz demerara sugar 125g/4oz muesli or a mixture of oats, seeds and chopped nuts (optional)

1. Preheat the oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas 6.

2. Peel, core and chop the apples into small chunks. Cut the lemons in half and squeeze

the juice over the apple and mix well. This not only adds flavour but prevents the freshly peeled apples from discolouring.

3. Layer the apples, blackberries, and sugar in a large pie dish (a lasagne dish is ideal).

4. Place the flour in a large bowl and then rub in the butter until it resembles breadcrumbs leave a few lumps of butter so that the topping is not too fine. Add the muesli or oat/ seed/nut mixture and the sugar and mix through.

5. Use a spoon to sprinkle the crumble topping evenly over the fruit. Bake for 45 minutes or until the fruit is cooked and bubbling juices seep through the topping.

6. Cool for a few minutes and then serve with custard, fresh cream or ice cream.

## T.M.B.C. News

#### Increase in Housing.

Last month I had to ask the Editor to retract one of my sections, due to the change of Government. I had written about the imminent publication of the Regulation 18B Consultation, but TMBC decided to pause the local plan having heard about the new government plans, especially regarding the Metropolitan Green Belt (MGB).

It appears, whereas we were directed to build 850 houses a year across the borough; we are now required to allow for 1057. As to where any of these houses are to be built, your guess is as good as mine! The Deputy Prime Minister and Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, Angela Rayner MP, wrote to all Council Leaders and Chief Executives. (Letter available from .Gov website, or I can send you a copy). In the letter she clearly states, in bold, 'would see Councils required to review boundaries and release Green Belt land, where necessary to meet unmet housing or commercial need'. That is a very clear statement.

This could happen, for example by recalling all previously suggested sites that were suggested at the initial stage of the current local plan development. There were quite a number in Hildenborough and one very large one between Hildenborough and Tonbridge. For now, it is wait and see. Since 1987, the Parish of Hildenborough has suffered very little from Green Belt incursion, things could be about to change. Before the Local Plan was paused, members were shown the interactive plans available to view via the TMBC website. The interactive plans have been designed to be easier to navigate and NO Login will be required. These plans will be available when more is known about the way forward for the Local Plan.

#### Highway Water Leaks.

I am indebted to the lady who rang me about the water leak on the B245 near to the Flying Dutchman, before the road was resurfaced. She also had been trying to talk to someone at South East Water with only little success. So maybe her efforts and mine encouraged SEW to fix the leak before the road was re-surfaced. It was only a shame that another larger leak appeared at the junction of Riding Lane and the B245 resulting in the closure of the B245, which in turn, caused traffic to bypass the closure using Mount Pleasant, Knowsley Way and even Half Moon Lane. South East Water really should have realised that a diversion route was necessary as it is them who should have organised it. The subsequent repair of the road surface, post water leak repair, thankfully, appears fine.

#### Leigh Barrier.

If you are on the mailing list for the barrier work, you will have received the Spring/Summer 2024 newsletter. If not, work slowed due to the very wet winter and early spring rain. Completion is still anticipated for the end of 2025. The new sewer pipes serving the Hawden Close pumping station which are diverting the flow of foul water to enable the Penstock to be constructed are being laid. At the barrier site, electrical works are being installed for the control structure prior to removal of the first gate. All the 3 new gates have arrived on site in sections and are being welded together. Each gate weighs about 12.5 tons. The bulk of my recent correspondence from Hildenborough residents has expressed concern over roadworks, new house building and the cost-of-living crisis. As a local councillor in an opposition party, my powers are extremely limited but let me try to address what I can.

Firstly, roadworks. Goodness me what a palaver! Between planned resurfacing works and emergency waterworks, it has felt like there are roadworks everywhere! For the roadworks by Riding Lane, the official diversion was down Noble Tree Road. Many drivers however, decided to make their own diversion and one of the contractors said that a local resident had moved the diversion sign! Consequently, there was a great deal of dangerous driving and a couple of minor collisions. Roadworks and maintenance of the highways is a KCC issue rather than TMBC, however I have requested extra traffic wardens when dangerous parking

has exacerbated the issue, and you can report dangerous driving to the police or report a parking problem to parking. office@tmbc.gov.uk.

We have a new government, who announced in the King's Speech the Planning and Infrastructure Bill, including a 1.5 million new homes target across the nation. Of course, this will affect TMBC and Hildenborough as we need to build our share of new and affordable homes. All I can say is please rest assured that I will be fighting to preserve our green spaces, ancient trees and local biodiversity as much as I can by scrutinising and speaking up about any developments that threaten these.

Finally, local resident Anthony Bales contacted me about encouraging people to address the matter of home insulation. Many of us could cut down on our heating bills by addressing this matter simply and effectively. TMBC are introducing a thermal imaging camera loan scheme which should be operational from October. Details of the scheme are currently being finalised however, it will help residents to identify weaknesses in their property's insulation and thus with taking the next steps needed to improve insulation, efficiency and comfort as well as reducing heating bills and carbon emissions. Energy loss areas such as doors and letter boxes can be sorted out simply by residents themselves using draught

excluders but matters such as cavity wall insulation and loft insulation will require more guidance. Useful information, including details of existing grant schemes can be found on the TMBC website www.tmbc.gov.uk/ housingupgrade

#### Hildenborough Village Preservation and surface water drainage also need Association

The 4<sup>th</sup> July saw a change to a government with radically different policies from the previous government. From the Association's perspective, we see the significant issues are as follows.

At the time of writing, government statements had been issued to reinstate the previously withdrawn annual housing quota, now 350,000 with encouragement to utilise grey belt sites to meet housing needs.

The implication for the village is that there will be renewed pressure on the local authority to approve new developments which in turn will result in Hildenborough being scrutinised for suitable sites. It is likely that the sites previously identified under the recent call for sites campaign will be resurrected.

Development of the village is inevitable but does not have to be detrimental. The key issues are to ensure that any new development is appropriate and includes enhancements to the local infrastructure.

In practical terms, this needs to be reflected in the sighting of any new housing away from flood plains and in appropriate positions such as not to compromise the road network, particularly the well-used B245 (London Road). Issues such as mains

to be carefully considered.

Any additional housing will increase the pressure on the two schools and the doctors surgery and consequently improvements will be required.

The association will be monitoring the situation closely with improvements to the infrastructure being a condition precedent to improve facilities for existing residents. The Association's view has greatly influenced past decisions on local planning policy. In this respect the greater the number of members, the more the influence.

On behalf of the Association, I would urge residents who are not yet members to join to ensure that you have your say. In this respect we would welcome participation at Committee level particularly from those local residents with skills associated with development, planning and construction backgrounds. Secretarial and accountancy skills would also be very welcome.

#### Wildlife in your garden

There are days in the summer when the insects are most busy. They like the warm days as the sun's warmth provides them with the energy they need. Those of us who have a garden can sit out in the sun and listen to the buzz and hum but even on a country walk or visiting someone else's garden you can enjoy the buzz of the insects visiting the flowers.

Whether the flowers are cultivated in formal beds in the garden you are in or just weeds growing at random, the insects do not discriminate. They are busy finding food. This idyllic setting of gentle buzzing is not all it seems.

When you look closer you come across a whole world of competition and deception. Each insect tries to get its share of the food the plants offer without itself becoming food. The source of this food is the pollen and nectar produced by the flower. The flower does this to attract the insects so they can spread the pollen to other flowers as they try to reproduce. It is rich in sugars and protein and bees can turn this into honey. Watch as a bee arrives at the flower, its hind legs are

fatter and more hairy than the other two pairs of legs. These are the "pollen baskets" where the bee will put the pollen to carry it back to the hive. The wild bees "Bumble Bees" also have honey baskets but if you see a bee without these honey baskets they are "Cuckoo Bees" bees that imitate the true bees and will lay their eggs in the nest of a true bee.

Pollen can have up to 35% protein in some flowers and it is also rich in carbohydrates making it a very important source of food for many insects and young spiders. These in turn are an important food source for young birds. Your pleasure at looking at garden flowers you have grown gives pleasure to you, but it also supports a whole pyramid of other animals. The fat "grub" you may see being fed to blackbird chicks can trace its food to your garden flowers. Weed flowers are just as beneficial as the flower of your prize rose so when your weeds grow consider their importance further along the food chain.


Sometimes as you watch, you will see a trail of fragments coming from the flower, down the stem, and into the soil. Look closely and you may see that the plant fragments are being carried by an army of ants. The ants are well organised, some will be carrying food (often pollen), others will be carrying freshly

cut leaf fragments. These are food for tomorrow. The leaves will ferment generating heat for the colony and fungi will grow to be food for the future. Ants also use aphids, greenfly or blackfly, in the way we would use cows. The aphids are "milked" for the honeydew they produce. This is the product of the sap the aphid takes from the plant. If you have every wondered how your row of beans may be free of blackfly when you go to bed but smothered when you visit next morning you can blame the ants. They will move the aphids to new plants to get the best supply of honevdew. They take with them the spores of the black mould which discolours your plant and adds to the weakening of your plants.







Note that it doesn't need to be the child's parents paying into the account; Uncles, Aunts, Grandparents and others can also make payments, The government have noticed that many families who are eligible for this scheme are yet to set up their accounts, so if you are an employer you could bring this to the attention of your staff to increase the take up.

Note that parents are not eligible if either of them have adjusted net income in excess of £100,000 for the current tax year.
