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Fawkes and a group of conspirators attempted to blow up the Houses of Parliament in London. However, as Christians, it provides us with an opportunity to reflect on deeper themes of justice, rebellion, and the nature of authority.

At its core, the Gunpowder Plot was born out of a context of religious oppression. Catholics in England faced severe restrictions and persecution under Protestant rule. The conspirators believed that their violent act would restore Catholicism to England. While their intentions stemmed from a desire for justice and religious freedom, their methods raise critical questions about the morality of rebellion and the consequences of our actions.

As Christians, we are called to consider how we respond to injustice in our world. The Bible teaches us that while we may face persecution or oppression, our response should be rooted in love, grace, and a commitment to nonviolence. In Matthew 5:44, Jesus instructs us to love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us. This radical call challenges us to seek peace rather than resorting to violence, even when we feel justified in our anger.

The story of Guy Fawkes also prompts us to examine the concept of authority. Romans 13:1-2 states, "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God." This scripture invites us to reflect on our relationship with government and societal structures. While it is essential to stand against unjust systems, we

reflect our Christian values.

Guy Fawkes Night, also known as Bonfire Night, commemorates the failed Gunpowder Plot of November 5, 1605, when Guy

Furthermore, Bonfire Night is characterised by the symbolism of fire. Fire can represent both destruction and purification. In the Bible, fire is often associated with God's presence and judgement. The burning bush encountered by Moses (Exodus 3:2) and the refining fire mentioned in Malachi 3:2-3 both illustrate how fire can signify God's holiness and the process of spiritual refinement. As we gather around bonfires to celebrate Guy Fawkes Night, we can use this imagery to reflect on our own lives. Are there aspects of our character that require the purifying fire of God's truth?

God's sovereign plan. Our task, then, is to

engage with these authorities in ways that

As Christians, we are called to be agents of change in our communities. Instead of merely celebrating the historical event of Guy Fawkes Night, we have the opportunity to engage in meaningful dialogue about faith, justice, and the ethics of rebellion. We can use this occasion to promote peace, understanding, and reconciliation in a world that often resorts to violence and division.

Guy Fawkes Night serves as a poignant reminder of the complexities of justice and authority. It invites us to reflect on our responses to oppression and the ways we engage with the world around us. To understand that people have different views on how they want to see justice lived out. Let us strive to embody Christ's love in our actions, seeking to build bridges rather than walls, and allowing the fire of God's truth to refine us into instruments of His peace.

In general: Close internal doors before going to bed. Blow out all candles and fully stub out cigarettes or other smoking materials. Know where your keys are to leave the house.

Winding the clock at St John's

My name is Tim Rice, and I have lived in the village for nearly twenty years with my wife Karen.

My voluntary role is turret clock keeper to the clock at St. John's Church.

I took on this role just over three years ago when Mick, who had been caring for the clock for seventeen years moved away. I had recently retired and was looking for volunteer work in the Keys magazine when I saw this opportunity.

The clock was installed in 1865 (costing £55.10.0) and the octave of tubular bells installed in 1887 in honour of Queen Victoria's Jubilee. The clock was extensively repaired in 1948, and the bells were refurbished in 1982, and the church bell recast in 1993.

Cylindrical weights provide power for the clock and for the striking mechanism. These slowly drop through a shaft that is about eight





metres deep and needs to be rewound every six days.



My tasks are to wind the clock and strike, check everything is functional, adjust to the correct time, including when the clocks change. The strike bell, above in the belfry, gets an occasional check.

Every couple of weeks, I ring the tubular bells to check they are all working. They do occasionally need adjustment.

All this only takes about 15 minutes every six days, longer if I do some cleaning.

The clock is serviced professionally every four or five years.

What skills have you picked up in this role? A good memory. So far, the clock hasn't run right down.

What is the best thing or your best memory about your role?

When Ben, my son in law spent a day helping me clean out the belfry. It had been badly soiled from pigeons roosting in there for several years. The wire that stopped them getting through the louvres was damaged. We managed to get all the birds out and block the holes until new wire could be fitted. Several bags of muck were removed. It was a twoman job with little room for manoeuvre.

Afterwards we were rewarded with a much fresher smelling tower!

What is the worst thing or your worst memory about your role? cleaning out the belfry. It was mucky, dusty, smelly, cramped and noisy on the hour.

If someone wants to learn more about your role, what is the best way of getting in contact with you?

There is a pdf available for download called "Turret-Clock Keeper's handbook" which gives a clear explanation of how everything works much better than I can.

Which 3 people, dead or alive would you invite for a dinner party and why?

I would invite Jesus. In Luke chapter 19 Jesus went to visit Zacchaeus. What interesting conversations they must have had.

Jesus died for us but is alive today. He is also God and the Holy Spirit, three people at my dinner table. There never has been and never will be anyone who could be more interesting to talk to.

FARMERS' MARKET RECIPE

Cheesy Chicken and Broccoli Bake

Ingredients

2 chicken breasts, diced 150g grated cheddar cheese 300g broccoli florets 2 tablespoons plain flour 200g pasta, penne or fusilli 2 tablespoons butter 1 onion finely chopped 2 cloves garlic, minced Fresh parsley, to garnish Salt and pepper, to taste 300 ml milk

Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C (160°C fan)

Cook the pasta in a pot of boiling water according to the package instructions. Drain and set aside. every week. Why not follow us on these sites for up-to-date information on stallholders and activities.

Stir in the flour and cook for 1 minute, then gradually whisk in the milk. Continue stirring until sauce thickens.

Remove the pan from the heat and stir in half the grated cheese. Season with salt and pepper. Combine the cooked pasta, diced chicken, and steamed broccoli in a large mixing bowl. Pour over the cheese sauce and mix well.

Transfer the mixture to a baking dish, sprinkle the remaining cheese on top and bake for 20 minutes until golden and bubbly.

Garnish with fresh parsley and serve hot.

It may surprise you to learn that from 1954 to 1977 Hildenborough had a thriving Choral Society. Regular concerts were given first in the Village Hall and later in St John's Church (see Minutes of the Hildenborough Choral Society - HHS archives). There have been few, if any, such events since then, which makes the forthcoming concert to be given by Temenos all the more special.

This is the 180th anniversary of St John's Church - it is also the 100th anniversary of the death of Sir Charles Villiers Stanford and the 150th anniversary of the birth of his pupil Gustav Holst - two giants of the English choral tradition. Temenos' programme has been specially chosen by Patrick Craig, counter-tenor, conductor and music director of Temenos. With this being the case it's more important than ever to let me know your thoughts so that I can raise these with the relevant operators and Kent County Council. I meet regularly with our local bus companies and I am able to raise these issues with them directly.

The Night Sky in Hildenborough – November 2024

The bright planets are coming into their own in the evening skies now having too long been the preserve of the early risers and shift workers.

Venus has been an evening object for some time but has been bumping along the horizon without gaining the height needed to make it instantly recognisable as the "Evening Star". Of course, it's worth remembering that by May next it will have moved to the other side of the Sun ready to be hailed as the "Morning Star".

At the beginning of November, 5pm is a good time to look low down and close to the south west to catch Venus when it will be just 7° high. The Sun will be 5° below the horizon then. As the month progresses, Venus gains very gradually in altitude and moves more towards the SSW. By mid-month it is 9° high (around 4:40pm) and by month's end it is nearly 13° in altitude in the SSW at 4:25pm. It will remain a brilliant evening object for us into March 2025 when it will return to the morning sky.

That favourite of telescopic observers, Saturn, is visible as soon as the sky is dark lying due south at 8pm early in the month and around 6:30pm by the end. The issue for Saturn is that it looks very much like a run-of-the-mill star without the brilliance of Venus or the other "gas giant", Jupiter. If you do have the chance to look at Saturn through a telescope you may recall what I said back in July when talking about its ring system. If you look now, the rings will appear to be quite narrow which is the precursor to the "ring plane crossing" that we will experience next March as the Earth passes through the plane of the rings and for a while they will seem to disappear.

Jupiter is also making its presence felt, rising in the early evening as it brightens towards early December when it and the Earth will be at their closest for the year. This is called "opposition" when Jupiter, the Earth and the Sun are all in a line with the Earth in the middle. Jupiter will be at its brightest and largest so this is an ideal time to look for it at a sociable time of night.

Mars is also getting in on the act although it rises a little later than Jupiter, around 9:15pm on the first of November. The red planet is approaching opposition so it is also brightening considerably.

This time of the year sees the welcome return of the striking winter constellations whose brilliance is in sharp contrast to the somewhat muted spring groups. We see the hunter, Orion, and his retinue of two dogs, some twins, a bull and a charioteer. Actually, there's also a hare and a unicorn but they're not nearly so bright. The diagram indicates the constellations in capitals and the brightest stars in italics.

Tales from the graveyard: Geoffrey DUNCAN

In our Churchyard there are two memorials to the same child. At 13, he was just a teenager in today's terms but then old enough to train for war. He was from the Duncan family, an established village family and had been sent to the Royal Naval College.

By 1917 thousands of young men had gone to war never to return. Every family's loss would be the same but only the wealthy could afford a commemorative memorial. In our Church on the wall behind the Lectern is a memorial plaque to Geoffrey the son of the Duncan family. There is also his grave in the Churchyard. Geoffrey had gone to train as a Naval Cadet then to become an officer in the Royal Navy.

He had been sent to the Royal Naval College, Osborne House on the Isle of Wight as a Cadet. The former Royal residence was used as a junior officer training college for the Royal Navy. The picture in the middle shows junior officers in

training. In 1902 international unrest led to a rapid expansion of the Navy and an urgent need to provide for young officers and additional training places. In 1903 part of the estate around the stables at Osborne House. The former Roval residence was to be used as a junior officer training college for the Royal Navy.


In 1917 a Measles epidemic had swept the country and the Naval College on the Isle of Wight was not immune. Measles is a highly infectious disease There was no medical knowledge of how to control infectious disease at this time. If disease broke out on a ship at sea it was quarantined and not allowed to dock until the disease had burnt itself out. This lack of knowledge is well illustrated by this young man who was brought back to the village to be buried in the churchyard in 1917 at the height of the epidemic. He was just 13 years old.

Geoffrey Duncan had joined the Navy and sent to the former Royal residence to be trained as a junior officer in the Royal Navy. At Osborne College he contracted measles and died of the complications of the disease which led to pneumonia. The young man's family gave him a military funeral, in keeping with the times. Today we have reduced the risks from Measles through vaccination. Almost all children in the UK receive a vaccination against it (and other diseases).

This was not the only epidemic of the First World War. Thousands on both sides died in the war as it neared its end due to an epidemic of "Spanish Flu" with killed thousands both in the trenches and at home.



Westwood pond looking tranquil this autumn

Last month saw a new member in attendance at the Parish Council meeting on 9th October, after local resident and management consultant, Mandy Pereira, was co-opted on to the council. Mandy has a special interest in local planning issues and was happy to accept an invitation to join the council's Planning Committee.

Highways

During last month's meeting, councillors agreed to carry out a Pre-consultation Engagement with the local community about

the installation of double yellow lines on London Road opposite the Harvest garage. Inconsiderate parking by vehicles across the pavement has been forcing pedestrians out on to the busy road and the Parish Council has a

record of numerous complaints about

the situation. The council also agreed to install a sign on Riding Lane to remind motorists to drive carefully as they approach the school, library and other amenities that attract the footfall of numerous pedestrians throughout the day.

Recreation Ground

Following a playground safety inspection earlier this year, the council have arranged for some areas of the playground surface in the Riding Lane Recreation Ground to be repaired. We apologise for any inconvenience this work may cause as areas of the playground will have to be cordoned off while repairs are carried out, but it is important to maintain the playground in good condition for the safety of its many visitors. Corroded

> sections of the basketball frames in the Multi Use Games Area adjacent to the tennis courts are being replaced this autumn, which will mean access will be limited at the facility for a day or two while the work takes place. Councillors have also been considering the next steps to take

regarding the installation

of a footpath around the perimeter of the Recreation Ground, a major project that will be largely funded by S106 monies generated by the Berkeley Homes Oakhill development which is nearing completion.

Westwood

Our landscape contractor visited the pump cycle track last month to clear away overgrown vegetation and any debris that may cause obstruction to cyclists. He has also cut back vegetation that was becoming invasive at the far corner of the track, revealing damage to the fence beneath which the Parish Council's maintenance contractor, Andy, has been attending to.

Andy has also been busy at Westwood pond, installing safety signs and equipment ready for when the renovated pond and its abundance of wildlife will be ready for nature enthusiasts to visit next spring. The Parish Council is in the process of creating a smart new Information Board which will tell visitors all about the project to turn the pond into a haven for the endangered Great Crested Newt and other species of wildlife that may be spotted there.

We have checked that the supply of sandbags in the store at Westwood is well stocked-up in case they are needed during the coming winter months. Hildenborough's drainage infrastructure does seem to have coped well with some recent prolonged and heavy downpours but it's always best to be prepared.

War Memorial

The Hildenborough Guides have been busy tidying up the plants around the War Memorial recently and have added some colourful new plants ready for Remembrance Sunday. New posts around the border of the War Memorial are also due to be installed and the work will be carried out later this year.
