

From the Church

Road Trips with God: Leaving Comfort Behind

There's something deeply symbolic about a road

trip. It's a journey into the unknown - bags packed, satnay set (hopefully), and a sense that something new lies ahead. This August at St John's, we're exploring Road Trips with God - moments in Scripture when God called people to journey with Him. And it all begins with a man called Abraham, or Abram as he was known back then.

In *Genesis 12:1–9*, God speaks to Abram with what must have felt like a terrifying instruction: "Go from your country, your people and your father's household to the land I will show you."

No map. No timeline. No clear destination. Just a promise. Leave everything familiar - your culture, your family, your roots - and trust that I'll show you where to go. For most of us, leaving home for a long road trip is a decision made with a lot of planning. For Abram, it was a step of raw obedience.

What makes this so powerful is that God doesn't promise comfort; He promises purpose.

"I will make you into a great nation... I will bless you... and you will be a blessing."

This wasn't just about Abram. This journey was the beginning of God's great plan to bless the whole world. It began with a single step of faith - away from the comfort zone.

So what does this mean for us at St John's?

We might not be packing up a camel caravan to head into the desert, but the call of God still invites us to journey.
Maybe it's a change of heart, a step into new things, reaching out to someone, letting go of control, or simply trusting Him in the unknown that lies ahead.

Churches too are called to move, to respond to God's promptings. Sometimes it's about changing how we do things, starting something new, or leaving behind what once felt familiar. And it can feel unsettling - like Abram must have felt - but it's in that moment that faith grows.

When we obey God's nudge to step out, He often uses it to shape not just our lives, but to bless others too. Abram probably had no idea that his "yes" would eventually lead directly, in the future to Jesus - the ultimate fulfillment of God's promise.

So here's a question to ponder this August: What comfort might God be asking you to leave behind?

Perhaps it's time to travel lighter spiritually speaking. Perhaps there's a new "road trip" ahead for you, one where the destination is unclear, but the Guide is trustworthy.

Like Abram, we won't have all the answers when we start. But we do have the promise of His presence, His blessing, and His purpose.

This summer, let's be a people who listen for the voice that says, "Go... to the land I will show you."

And let's pack faith before fear and trust that our maker knows us better than we know ourselves and we are safe when we walk with Him.

Meet the volunteer - Becky Mackay, founder of Tonbridge Harvest

Hi I'm Rebecca (Becky) Mackay. We initially moved out of London in 2016 while I was on maternity leave, as my husband Caspar had a job based in Tonbridge. We rented in Leigh and loved it, then we bought a house here in Hildenborough and loved it more! We moved here in 2019. Our son was born a few months later. Both children attend Stocks Green Primary school.

I created Tonbridge Harvest in 2021 with the idea of sending volunteers into people's gardens to pick any unwanted or excess fruit. The idea is to reduce food waste, make the most of our lovely Kent apples, and offer a hand to those who may no longer have the ability to pick their own gardens. I then re-distribute it outside our local schools, partly to encourage children to eat local food which might not quite look like it does in the supermarket and to offer pesticide-free and price-free food. The idea came from literature online about "gleaning" unwanted crops from farmers' fields. The Bible apparently tells farmers to leave corners of their fields unharvested, not to pick up that which was dropped (gleanings) and not to harvest any over-looked produce that had been forgotten when they harvested the majority of a field." (Editors note: This passage can be found in Leviticus 23:22) Websites such as The Abundance Network (www.abundancenetwork.org. uk) and Foodrise Urban Harvesting (www.gleaning.foodrise.org.uk) also helped.

We're a bunch of ad-hoc local volunteers and I'm always on the lookout for more people to join up. On occasion we use

schoolchildren who absolutely love climbing a local tree to pick (with thanks to Carol and Tony). Separate to this I also volunteer to collect food for the Olio waste reduction app from the foodbank at Tonbridge Baptist Church. This goes to our Hildenborough foodbank when timing allows, or otherwise people can collect food from outside my house, which would otherwise have been thrown away by the supermarkets.

In terms of a time commitment - Very few unless it's fruit picking time when it might be half a day each week. It has to fit around other commitments. It was also put on the back burner for a while as I had a toddler and underwent cancer treatment.



One of my highlights is that it's given me the confidence to climb high and hang off the end of a ladder! But on the downside, there is forever the potential hazard of having an apple fall on your head!

Overall, it's been a brilliant way to get to know a much wider range of people here in Hildenborough and make friends in the community. I must give a plug for the wonderful tea tray the lovely Helen provides for us when we go to pick her orchard.

Going forward, I'd love to create a virtuous circle of enough volunteers, schools and getting the Scouts, Cubs or Brownies involved to be able to pick more of the private, often wild, orchards locally. I'm confident we could then use the apple press at Tonbridge School to make our own juice, as well as using all those knowledgeable people in our community to make jams and chutneys and teach our younger generations how to do it. Perhaps I can also hook up with the WI for this. And I would love to learn how to prune fruit trees properly.

Arts and culture are flourishing in the local community often with little by way of external funding - please read through the following events and try and get to one if you can!

Hildenborough Road Race – Supporting Our Village, Together. We need you!

What a brilliant year it's been for the Hildenborough Road Race! Not only was it a great day full of energy, encouragement and community spirit, but thanks to a bumper fundraising total – helped by a surplus from previous years – we've been able to share out nearly £6,000 to support eight fantastic local causes:

The Oaks Nursery, Stocks Green Pre-School, Hildenborough Badminton Club, Hildenborough Stoolball Club, Hildenborough Girl Guides, Tonbridge Juddians Girls Section, Compaid and Leigh Primary School.

The money will go towards all sorts of valuable things – from outdoor play equipment and sports gear to team kits, training resources and updates to outdoor spaces. We also donated a further £500, on behalf of our volunteer photographers, to the Hospice in the Weald and Empathy Action - both local and very important charities. Every penny raised goes straight back into our community, which is exactly the purpose of the race.

The race is organised entirely by volunteers, and it really is a much-loved local tradition. Due to a few changes this year, we now only have a very small organising committee and while we absolutely love putting the event together, we simply can't do it all on our own.

We need **more people to help with the planning side** - general admin, helping with promotion, sorting signage, organising sponsorship or coordinating suppliers and other volunteers. These jobs don't take loads of time, but they make a huge difference to our workload.

We also struggle every year to get enough committed help on the day (and the days immediately before) until the very last minute. Although we always somehow muddle through, it puts a lot of unnecessary pressure on the small team behind the scenes. There are so many jobs to fill - from helping to set up and pack away, helping put out signage, helping on the registration desk, driving lead and sweep cars, manning the village hall door, trimming overhanging brambles on the route and so on. If you can take on one of these roles and commit a little earlier, we'd be incredibly grateful.

We'll be reviewing things in **November**, when planning for the 2026 race begins, and if we don't have enough support in place by then, we'll have to seriously consider whether we can go ahead. We'd love nothing more than to keep the race going for years to come – but we need more hands to make it happen.

So, if you've ever taken part in the race, cheered someone on, or just love what it brings to the village – please consider getting involved. It's a great team, and a wonderful way to give something back to the community.

From our MP: Tom Tugendhat

We all know how potholes have become a persistent plague on our roads. Indeed, 95% of claims to local authorities from drivers are related to potholes. A third of Kent County Council's (KCC) highways and road maintenance expenditure is spent on pothole repairs. But we all know more needs to be done.

On average, 14,922 potholes were filled per authority in England over the past year. However, there were 24,217 potholes and road surface problems reported to KCC, which – although down from the year before – is unacceptable.

According to the Department for Transport, 53% of Kent's roads have been flagged for maintenance. The Government - both Labour and Conservative - have given KCC more than £202 million over the last 5 years for highways and roads maintenance.

We now have a County Council who have pledged to fill in every single pothole. So, I want to help them do that. I have created a dedicated page on my website – www.tomtugendhat.org/potholes - where you can share with me any pothole you see, whether it be in your road, on your journey to work, or simply as you're walking past.

Please share with me as much information as you can, including the location of the pothole and, if you can get one safely, a picture. I will then contact KCC directly, on your behalf, to ensure they are doing as promised - and repairing every single pothole across every single street in Hildenborough.

My work is guided by you and your priorities, so please do share your thoughts with me, or contact me if you have any issues I can help with.

Hildenborough Village Preservation Association – HVPA

The last Keys article issued by HVPA alluded to renewed pressure to develop sites around Hildenborough Village and Hilden Park having regard to the change in Government.

Accordingly, TMBC has renewed its appeal for suitable sites to be put forward having regard to the previous "Call for Sites" campaign which was frustrated by the Covid outbreak.

At the end of 2024, Vistry published proposals for development of a site in Noble Tree Road to build 120 houses however no formal Planning Application has been forthcoming.

More recently at the end of May a similar exercise has been carried out by Hillbridge Park Limited to provide 40 new houses on a farmland site at the rear of 100 Tonbridge Road. Enabling works have already been undertaken in this respect although to date NO formal Planning Application has been made.

The Association has firm views on the future development of the Village as may be seen from the HVPA website.

The main concerns are the loss of Greenbelt land, over development without due regard to improvement of the infrastructure such that there is adequate provision made for schooling and the Doctors Surgery.

The B245 through Hildenborough also requires upgrading having been previously determined by HVPA via a professionally prepared Traffic Survey that the Road is running close to capacity.

Any future development along Tonbridge Road will adversely affect road safety.

The Association needs the views of residents regarding the future of Hildenborough. Your thoughts and views are invited and may be left by emailing hildenboroughvpa@gmail.com

Please consider the points made on the HVPA website carefully as these may adversely affect the nature of Hildenborough.

HVPA urges all local residents to be members of the Association as the larger the membership the greater the influence it has particularly with planning matters. Details of how to join are on the website.

Hildenborough Cricket

Father and son, Oliver and Carter Stell made



an impact with both bat and ball in the 43-run win over Wrotham St George. Richard Sparks' contender for catch-of-the-season was another highlight as Hildenborough claimed a third successive victory. Oliver hit 11 fours in his unbeaten 68 not out off 79 balls in a total of 147 in 35 overs. Sparks followed up his impressive fielding by dismissing visiting top scorer Matthew Crisp (56). Russell Skinner finished with 3-33, while Carter claimed the final wicket with only his third ball for the club on his debut -Greg Smith chipping in with two stumpings -Wrotham all out for 104.

An opening stand of 90 between JP Martens (51)

and Greg Smith (27) helped Hildenborough to a nine-wicket success against Chevening Amblers. Both retired not out, leaving Richard Sparks' unbeaten 27 off 21 balls with four fours to get them home on 131-1 inside 22 overs. Amblers were 67-5 at one stage before middle order runs pushed them to 127-7. Digby Russell and Tom Collier claimed two wickets each. Billy Francis and Mark Skinner one apiece - the latter answering a late callup.

Hildenborough and Capel Development produced a total of 400 runs in a 35overs-a-side contest. Mark Davies (51) Joe Sargent (46) and Dean Sands (38) including a total of 22 fours -led the way in the villagers' trial if 207-3. Pieter Booyse's unbeaten 101 was the standout performer for Capel as they finished on 193-6, earning Hildenborough a 14-run win.

Mark Skinner's four wickets couldn't prevent defeat at Brasted Invicta. 45 extras - including 28 wides - proved the highest score in Hildenborough's 111 - built around two stands of 28 and 24 - for the fourth and fifth . opener Greg Smith staying 72 balls to make top score of 28. Invicta's second wicket stand was the key to the four-wicket success despite Skinner's pick of the bowler's performance.

Hildenborough Parking Review Correction.

I need to make a correction to my 'Keys' report for last month. At the Joint Transportation Board meeting, members decided to abandon all the Hildenborough proposals, except for the B245, Double Yellow Lines from Foxbush to Watts Cross Road, this means that the Ashley Road Double Yellow Lines at the entrance to Ashley Road will now <u>not</u> go ahead.

Flood Storage Works.

Residents who have signed up for the Environment Agency (EA) newsletter will be aware of this, so for other residents, the EA states that works are progressing well, the new centre gate was lifted into position in May, four to five weeks of testing followed, picture shows new gate with workers (for size) in Orange.



Along the stream behind the houses in Stacey Road, the concrete for the Penstock Chamber walls, are complete. This can be seen in the picture, work has also started on the new pumping station which is near to the Penstock Chamber.




The EA report that as part of the planning permission, they are committed to improving the Straight Mile and Powder Mill Stream, both unnaturally wide with slow moving water, causing silt to build up. The EA wants to; increase daylight to the bank and channel, improve Oxygen levels and wash away silt to expose gravel for fish to spawn. So, they cut down 55 specifically

chosen trees and installed them as Timber Deflectors to narrow sections of the channels, as seen in the picture.

Now pardon me, but that looks like a man-made blockage should detritus become trapped by the

Timber Deflector. So, I emailed my concerns to the EA and their response was:



'Thank you for your email. The deflectors we have installed are a standard river restoration technique used in both urban and rural watercourses. They are smooth apart from the final end point which could temporarily trap some minor woody material. However, the flood risk down both the Straight Mile and Powder Mill Stream is controlled by the Leigh Flood Storage Area which means that large timber structures (i.e. blockages to flow) can exist in the channel without increasing flood risk. Flood risk calculations have been carefully conducted and approved by flood risk engineers. I hope this reassures you'.

Planning Costs.

If a planning application is refused, either by planning officers or the Planning Committee (if officers recommend approval) the applicant has the option to appeal the decision. The appeal may be awarded to the applicant; thus, the Council generally loses control of the application unless the Planning Inspector instigates recommendations that align with the Council. This procedure can cost the Council a great deal of money (Costs) the budget for costs has a limit. Costs however are not part of the planning process, so are not considered during the debate.

But if members turn down an application against advice of approval, we defer to Full Council for a Costs report. It's a Catch 22 situation, if ever there was one.

The Night Sky in Hildenborough – August 2025

If you're an early riser, then you're in luck if planets are your thing because Saturn, Jupiter and Venus are all visible in the morning skies throughout August. In fact, on the 12th, Jupiter and Venus are very close together (less than 1° apart) nearly due east at 5am with an altitude of 20°. If you prefer your astronomy in the evenings then the planets will be back on view later in the year for you.

Of course, planets aren't the only things that orbit the Sun. Beside the eight planets there are five dwarf planets; Ceres, Pluto, Haumea, Makemake and Eris in order from the Sun outwards. Then there are countless asteroids that exist in the asteroid belt mostly between the orbits of Mars and Jupiter. These are mainly made up of metals and rock

At a much greater distance from the Sun is another band of generally small objects that inhabit the "Kuiper Belt" which lies beyond Neptune. Actually, the dwarf planet, Pluto, is a member, and indeed the largest member, of this belt although, at one time, Pluto was thought to exist in splendid isolation. Now astronomers think that there are at least 100,000 objects that measure over 100km in diameter. What number of smaller bodies exist there is a matter for conjecture. The bodies in this belt are, in the main, composed of ices of water, methane, ammonia and sulphur dioxide, amongst others.

The other type of solar system objects that we haven't considered yet are comets. Until fairly recently it was thought that bodies in the Kuiper belt were gravitationally disturbed and sent towards the inner solar system to become comets as they heated up and gave off volatile gasses to make them visible. This idea has lost support and it is now thought that comets, particularly those with a short orbital period come from a group of objects even more distant than

the Kuiper Belt known as the Oort Cloud. I should say that this cloud is currently purely theoretical!

Whatever it is that causes comets to come our way, or where ever they originate from, one thing we can thank comets for are the various displays we see by way of meteor showers every year and, of course, the arrival of August is a reminder that one of the year's most active displays (the Perseids) is imminent.

The name meteor can cause some confusion because it refers only to a piece of space debris that enters the Earth's atmosphere and "burns" up. This debris can range in size from a grain of sand up to something in the order of 1 metre in diameter. Much of this material has been ejected from comets (occasionally asteroids) as they pass through the solar system. Before it announces itself in a streak of light as it hits the atmosphere, it will have been in orbit around the Sun and at that time would be called a "meteoroid". If that meteoroid, having become a meteor and "burnt" up, should be large enough for some part of it to reach the ground then the part that lands becomes a "meteorite".

I use the term "burn" loosely because very small pieces of debris are heated by colliding with the particles in the atmosphere whereas larger objects that make the same journey are heated by something known as "ram pressure" though the differences between the two are immaterial to us.

Don't forget that the Perseid meteor shower reaches its peak on the evening of August 12th. You should go out and look as soon as it begins to get dark because a waning gibbous Moon will interfere although it will initially be low in the east. Because of that, try looking between the north west (towards the Plough) and the north east.

At Hildenborough CE Primary School, we have been digging during our weekly Forest School sessions. Over the past year or so, we've started to uncover bottles and pots. We were fascinated by the items we had found and began collecting them for a display - which has been growing rapidly!

In Term 6, we launched an Archaeology Club and continued to discover many artefacts, including glass bottles, ink bottles, pottery jars, shards of glass, plates, and cups. We've also been learning how

to use a trowel and dig proper trenches. Mrs Buckland often reminds us to keep "straight sides!" - she's an expert in the field.

We have several theories about why we're finding so many jars, bottles, and pieces of pottery. One theory is that there may have once been a doctor's surgery or chemist on the Forest School site, based on the poison bottles and pestle and mortar we uncovered. Another idea is that all these items were thrown into the pond in the Recreation Ground (which lies just beyond our fence). Perhaps, over time, when the pond was dredged or emptied, the rubbish was deposited on the nearby land.

We would love to continue Archaeology Club next year and to learn more about the history of our school and the local area—especially as we prepare to celebrate the school's 180th anniversary in 2027. We hope to explore other parts of the school grounds too. Who knows? We might even uncover evidence from the Second World War or from when the school was first built!

CHILDCARE ACCOUNTS CAN SUBSIDISE SUMMER CHILDCARE COSTS

If you have children under 12 who attend a nursery. after school club, playscheme or childminder, or you are considering sending them to a summer camp, you should think about setting up a tax-free childcare account. The government adds 25% to the amounts that you save in the account - up to £2,000 for each child - so £8,000 is topped up to £10,000 (a higher amount applies for disabled children).

The account is then used to pay Ofsted registered childcare providers. Note that it doesn't need to be the

child's parents paying into the account; Uncles, Aunts, Grandparents and others can also make payments. The government have noticed that many families who are eligible for this scheme are yet to set up their accounts, so if you are an employer you could bring this to the attention of your staff to increase the take up.

Note that parents are not eligible if either of them has adjusted net income in excess of £100,000 for the current tax year.
